There is an important project underway for 2022. It's called the DRI, the Downtown Revitalization Initiative, a state-run program that awards one community in the North Country a \$10,000,000 grant for major projects that will revitalize their downtown. Previous winners include Plattsburgh, Saranac, Lake Placid, Tupper Lake, Malone, and Watertown. We believe Ticonderoga is ready to be the next recipient of this transformative DRI grant.

It's a town project being led by our new supervisor, Mark Wright, and driven by a committee including Ti-Alliance, PRIDE of Ticonderoga, the Ti Area Chamber of Commerce, the Ti Montcalm Street Partnership, Essex County IDA, and several community-at-large members. We need input from the entire community for our application. This includes residents of Ti and the surrounding towns, year-round and seasonal, who use Ti as their "hub."

In the coming weeks, the DRI committee will host some community meetings and distribute surveys to explore ideas for projects and set priorities to include in our Downtown Revitalization proposal. Public participation in this process is essential to making the best plan and application possible. Please make your voice heard and help revitalize our community.

Welcome to the Desert

Rural America is often called a childcare "desert." The childcare situation in the Ticonderoga Area makes the desert look good. A recent survey done by the Child Care Coordinating Council of the North Country identified more than six children for every one childcare slot in our community. Our employers, workforce, and families have all been directly impacted. Parents face decisions of whether to try to juggle work with childcare or quit their jobs. This is not sustainable. Our working families can not afford to quit their jobs as a childcare solution.

Last month this crisis came to a head at Ticonderoga Schools when several teachers lost their childcare provider for the 4th time in two years. Cynthia Ford-Johnston, our superintendent, contacted us to see if we wanted to partner with them to explore solutions.

It's time to solve this issue the way we know how; by coming together with a community-wide effort to figure it out. We're starting with a survey that will be distributed to area employers and online. It will help us establish our needs for "kid slots," age groups, convenience, scheduling, and more. If you have children ages infant - 17 years old in your household or have family members with children, please fill out the survey at www.ticonderoga-alliance.org/challenge-of-childcare. For people without access to the Internet, paper surveys are available at the Ti School offices, Town of Ti community building, Ticonderoga Area Chamber office, and Ti-Works.

We have a long way to go in exploring potential facilities, staffing requirements, training, funding, and many logistics, but we're starting now.
