Town of Ticonderoga Awarded \$10M NYS DRI Grant!

On January 23, 2023, a crowd gathered in the Community Center to hear New York Secretary of State, Robert Rodriguez, announce that the Town of Ticonderoga will be the 6th round recipient of the North Country region's Downtown Revitalization Initiative Grant (DRI). The \$10 million grant will be transformative for the community.

Revitalizing a Downtown Landmark

You may know it as the Newbury's Building or the Hacker Building. We're calling it the 108 Montcalm Project. In November, we announced that Ti-Alliance had acquired this abandoned eyesore on Montcalm Street. Since then, we have been working to secure the space and build a plan for



the restoration of the building. It's a \$2.5M project requiring an 18,000 sq. ft. roof, asbestos abatement, electrical, plumbing, HVAC, interior walls, and insulation. It's a big project. We recently applied for a New York State RestoreNY grant. If we get the grant, it will help finance a good portion of the renovations, but we need to raise other private funds to complete the work.

We expect this building to become the home of a new tourist attraction: Star Trek the Next Generation Set Tours. It will attract more than 15,000 visitors to Ticonderoga and pump over \$1.5M in revenue into our economy annually. That's huge for a North Country business. Imagine the visual transformation in downtown when we replace the boarded-up storefront with a new facade. Imagine how the year-round traffic will impact the rest of the downtown businesses. Imagine all the new retail and restaurant businesses that the residents and visitors will enjoy! It's a game changer for Downtown Ticonderoga.

Educating a Skilled Workforce

This past August, with a very generous donation from George Singer, Ti-Alliance established the George C. Singer Scholarship Endowment Fund. This endowment will provide resources to support Skilled Career Training Scholarships for local students so that they can pursue their career choices, and so that we can build a skilled workforce for our community.

Many students in our community have aspirations in these skilled fields (construction, medical, culinary, etc.) but lack the financial resources to continue their education after high school. George and other generous donors have put us on the path of generating multiple scholarships each year through the endowment, but we need to build the fund. Our goal is to build our principal to \$250,000 in 2023.

These scholarships change lives. Brett Moore, Ti High Class of 2019, graduated from SUNY Wanakena Forest Ranger School in 2021. David Bechard, a 2020 scholarship recipient, graduated from the North East Linemen Institute in 2022 and is working for Hour Electric as a lineman. Brandon Provoncha, a 2021 scholarship recipient, graduated from Modern Welding and works as a wind turbine welder for FieldCore, a GE Company. As a recent graduate of a welding academy, he was able to mentor Andrea Paige, Class of 2022, through her program at Advanced Welding Institute. Andrea will graduate in March and will be visiting Ti High to talk with other students about her passion for welding and experience at trade school. It's amazing to see how much these scholars have grown in a short time and to see them "paying it forward."

Building Community Childcare

Our childcare initiative is a priority for Ti-Alliance this year. Our working committee, the Ticonderoga Community Childcare Alliance, is hard at work to tackle the childcare challenge in our community. The committee is comprised of childcare industry professionals and agencies, local employers, and community members all dedicated to achieving the goal of sustainable public childcare for the Ticonderoga Area.

The team is currently exploring suitable locations and buildings that could support a center, creating operational business plans, recruiting potential staff, and solidifying a fundraising strategy. Working on these critical areas in tandem will help us escalate a timeline for delivering a center within a year.
